

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# A MESSAGE FROM DR. MATTHEWS

In the book *Finding Orion*, by John David Anderson, Rion, a 12-year-old boy named after the Orion constellation, is finding out about the importance of family as he works to find himself. In the course of the story, Rion, at one point, reflects on parents. As he contemplates parenting, he says this:

"You fall and they catch you. I don't know a whole lot about parenting being twelve years old and never even having kissed a girl, but I know that's a big part of it – the catching not the kissing. They wait at the end of the slide the first time you go down, they stand at the bottom of the stairs, they hold your hand as you teeter along the icy driveway. You're going to fall, they know it, so they spend fifty-nine seconds of every minute watching so that they can be there when your shoelaces trip you up, waiting to say, 'I've got you.'"

As we approach the start of 2025, I begin to wonder what it will take to help us all make it through another year successfully. What it takes is people who care deeply for others. People, like parents, who, as Rion says, "... spend fifty-nine seconds of every minute watching so that they can be there when your shoelaces trip you up, waiting to say, 'I've got you."

But even with great parents, we all need a little more help.

In the Rockford Public Schools, we also have a lot of people who think about others and say, "I've got you," multiple times a day. People like bus drivers, secretaries, security staff, child care workers, food service staff, parapros, mental health liaisons, counselors, social workers, teachers, and principals.

There are a lot of people in our schools. Each one has a job that is important.

While each person in our district has a defined job and many responsibilities, just like Rion thought about parents, each Rockford Public Schools employee's most important job is to be prepared to catch people if, and when, they fall.

That responsibility is not in our job descriptions. It is not listed as an important qualification. But, it is critical if we are to be successful in supporting our students, families, and staff.

In the Rockford Public Schools, our students and families and staff go about each day focused on doing what we need to do. But, every now and then everyone needs help. And when a student or a family or a staff member needs help, we have staff who will be there to catch people, support people, and say, "I've got you."

Those of us who work for the district know that our first responsibility is to educate the students who come to our schools. We work hard to make sure our students know how to read and write, know how to calculate and solve problems, and know how to think and communicate.

However, we also know that sometimes people fall. Sometimes learning is hard. Sometimes life is hard. Sometimes, even when we try so hard, things fall apart. When that happens our students and families need to have confidence that there will be someone there to help catch them.

Our staff understand that we are there to make sure our students learn and that our parents have the resources that they need to support their children. And, at those times when a little more is needed, the people of the Rockford Public Schools will be there to say, "I've got you."

So Happy New Year! I look forward to what 2025 will bring knowing that there are people around us to catch us if we fall.

### **SCHOOL CLOSING INFORMATION**

### SCHOOL CLOSINGS/DELAYS

The decision to close or delay school can be a tricky one. As a Michigan resident, you know how fickle our weather is. Just as weather systems can appear without warning, there are times when weather systems predicted to appear do not. Please keep in mind that a forecast is a prediction. Even skilled meteorologists will agree that not all watches, warnings, and advisories materialize as predicted.

School personnel carefully monitor weather forecasts and road conditions. The Rockford Public Schools district spans approximately 97 square miles. Therefore, weather and road conditions can be significantly different within our school district. Ultimately, the decision to close or delay school is made by the Superintendent of Schools, with every effort to make a decision by 5:30am.

In summary, weather is unpredictable and district staff does their best to make reasonable and practical decisions with the safety of students as their top priority. In addition, please keep in mind that weather conditions can rapidly improve or decline from the time a decision is made in the early hours of the morning to the time school is scheduled to start. If at any time you feel it is unsafe to send your child(ren) to school due to the weather or road conditions, you are encouraged to exercise your right to keep them home with an excused absence.

### **EARLY DISMISSALS**

Once students are in school, it is only in extreme cases the district would dismiss early due to weather, mainly due to the fact that many of our younger students could potentially go home to an empty house. However, in the rare case of an early dismissal, this will be posted on TV and the district website, and parents will be notified via the district's automated School Messenger system and/or the school phone tree.

Occasionally when road conditions deteriorate during the day, a decision is made to dismiss students up to one-half hour early to allow buses additional travel time so students arrive home at their regularly scheduled time. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact your school principal or the Superintendent's Office at 616.863.6557. To receive free text information about School Closings or Delays, just send a text message of "Y" or "Yes" to 67587.

Morning closings and delays are posted on the district website and local TV/radio stations, with several stations offering notification options such as text or email alerts


